Medium to full-bodied, deep and concentrated, it's sumptuous and dramatic, with huge reserves of fruit that are complemented by carnal, savory nuances and framed by melting tannins and ripe acids. Tasted next to its peers, Lafite is so typical of itself and less marked by the year. And that is one of the signs of a truly great terroir. Lafite-Rothschild is not as showy as many other wines in this vintage, but it is so true to its own identity, and that is the highest compliment I can pay it. The 2005 is 89% Cabernet Sauvignon, 10% Merlot and 1% Petit Verdot, done in 100% new oak, which is not at all noticeable. Medium to deep garnet-purple in color, it's profoundly scented of plum preserves, chocolate-covered cherries and blueberry pie with nuances of black olives, lavender, unsmoked cigars and cast iron pan plus a touch of Indian spices. The rich, medium to full-bodied palate is completely packed with tightly wound fragrant earth, black fruit and exotic spice layers, supported by perfectly ripe, wonderfully velvety tannins and seamless freshness. The epically long finish delivers a sum that is greater than the many compelling characters imparted on the nose and palate, whispering promises of a whole myriad of provocative finishes to discover throughout this wine's very long future. The palate is again quite discrete at first and unfolds at a glacial pace. It is beautifully balanced with fine tannin, quite linear and structured, gently building towards a finish that has wonderful salinity (continuing that marine theme). Note: I actually returned to taste this several hours later, because it was so closed earlier on and it did finally open, which is atypical for this Pomerol. I would note that a bottle tasted in 2015 displayed very heavy reduction but my conclusion at that time was that it would gradually dissipate with age, and that prediction appears to be coming true." While this is still clearly extremely young 2006 is one of the few vintages of the DRC Richebourg with less than 20 years of age that could be reasonably approached now though I stress that there is still considerable upside development potential remaining. The caressing and succulent mid-palate somehow manages to be at once highly seductive yet almost painfully intense and imposingly scaled while exuding of the big-bodied and incredibly dense flavors that flash evident minerality on the massively long and impeccably well-balanced finale where the only nit is again suggestion of warmth. As one might reasonably expect, this is presently firmly austere, and firmly tannic, which confirms that it is indisputably destined for a very long life as it should see its 50th birthday in excellent shape. This bottle of 1815 Rainwater Madeira originates from the esteemed Ridgely family cellars at **Hampton Mansion**, one of the great estates of the early American republic and the home of **Charles Carnan Ridgely**, Governor of Maryland from 1816 to 1819. Bottled in 1910, it bears the “G.G.” mark found in the **archival invoice of 200 bottles** sold that year by **John Ridgely** to **J.P. Morgan**, the legendary financier and collector. That invoice—now preserved in the archives of the **Hampton National Historic Site**—lists two crates (Boxes 13 and 14) specifically containing “Hampton Madeira 1815 G.G.,” directly matching this bottle.

The label affixed to the glass offers a brief biography of Governor Ridgely and a generational accounting of the family. However, as noted by Chief Curator **Gregory R. Weidman**, it is unlikely the Ridgelys produced these labels themselves. The label’s historical narration—referencing facts the family would already have known—suggests it was likely commissioned by **J.P. Morgan** or his Baltimore agent **Douglas H. Thomas**, a prominent banker and renowned Madeira collector who helped facilitate the transaction. This type of label may have been created for cataloging or gifting purposes within Morgan’s inner circle and reflects the connoisseurial flair of the Gilded Age elite.

This particular bottle was later acquired at the **Heublein Premiere National Auction of Rare Wines** on **May 22, 1976** in New Orleans. According to Hampton’s curators, another bottle from the same bottling—with nearly identical labeling—was donated to the museum in 1991 by a Washington, D.C. gentleman who had received it from the owner of the **Brussels Restaurant**, a famed New York dining institution that closed in the 1980s. That donor also provided a photocopy of the Heublein auction listing, linking the bottle back to the 1976 sale.

Sister bottles with matching labels and verified Ridgely provenance are now housed in the **permanent collection of the Hampton National Historic Site**. With a vintage marking the very year Ridgely took office, provenance tying it to **both an American governor and one of the most powerful financiers in history**, and physical documentation preserved in a national archive, this bottle is not only a relic of Madeira’s golden age—it is a **tangible artifact of American history, collecting culture, and transatlantic legacy**.
